## Flemington Raid is Subject of Annual Meeting Talk

The annual meeting of the Hunterdon County Historical Society, on March 30, 2008, will be held at the Flemington Public Library at 2 pm. Society President Richard Stothoff will present a talk on the Revolutionary War Flemington raid by the Queen's 16th Light Dragoons that took place on December 14, 1776. A talk on this subject, scheduled to be presented by Mr. Charles Riddle a year ago, was cancelled due to bad weather.

Mr. Stothoff has been involved with the preservation of this Raritan Township skirmish site since 1950 as an Eagle Scout project, and later with the Raritan Township Historical Committee to restore the site after the marker was knocked over during construction of a new housing development.

The Hunterdon County Historical Society has, since the 1880's, researched the data on the raid, the various people involved, the excavation of the site where a British officer, Cornet Francis Geary, was killed and buried, and made contact with the Geary family in England.

An interesting letter of 1922 from Geary's great-nephew to Hiram E. Deats of our society expressed his gratitude for sending over the buttons of Cornet Geary's uniform, and to the farmer who looked after the monument. He also revealed the fact that Cornet Geary's father, an admiral in the British Navy, commanded a fleet that blockaded the French fleet in Brest for over two months in 1780, delaying French support of the Americans and the end of the Revolutionary War.

The talk will summarize and bring out what precipitated the raid and activities of the nearby loyalists and Amwell militia. Thomas Lowry's son-in-law and partner was a Tory, had his Flemington property confiscated, and moved to New York City with the British. Edward Shippen, Benedict Arnold's future brotherin-law, was operating a nearby general store on River Road. He joined General Howe's army at New Brunswick prior to the raid and was captured and released by General George Washington on December 26, 1776. All of the information included in this presentation has been gathered from the records preserved by the Hunterdon County Historical Society.

### Bethlehem Presbyterian Church Records, 1768-1790

Roxanne K. Carkhuff

The records transcribed here were copied in February 1991 from the Sessions Book of the Grandin Presbyterian Church, earlier known as the Bethlehem Presbyterian Church, and previously as the New Frame Church, and ever earlier as the Old Stone Church. The congregation is one of the oldest in Hunterdon County, and was originally organized in 1730. Formerly located in Lebanon Township, the church is adjacent to the original church and is at present within the boundaries of Union Township.

Copied the same day as the following records was a 1795 subscription list for the churchyard adjoining the church. This list was published in a previous issue of the Hunterdon Historical Newsletter, on page 618 of the Spring 1991 publication. The original order, spelling, and spacing are preserved here. Page numbers are enclosed in parentheses; not all numbered pages of the book were used to record information. Editorial notes are enclosed in brackets. These are the earliest extant records of the congregation and were in the minister's custody when copied.

The Session Book / for the Congragation belonging to the Frame Meeting House in Bethlehem Township made / in the Year of our Lord one thousand seven / and sixty nine in which is Recorded all / the Marriages and Childrens names that / are Baptized with their age from their Birth / from January the 1st 1769 [lower part of page torn away]

### FROM THE CURATOR'S DESK

Did You Know?

The membership of the Hunterdon County Historical Society is well aware of the valuable library of genealogical resources that are available for research in the Deats Memorial Library attached to the Society's home and museum. Many of our members, however, are unaware that our holdings extend well beyond the shelves of books and files of genealogical research available in the reading room.

In addition to the Society's historical and genealogical library, the Society maintains and is constantly expanding a considerable group of archival collections and historical manuscripts. At this printing, our Society has 72 archival collections that are open to reference, and these collections contain a wealth of material that is a significant documentary repository of the history of Hunterdon County. These collections include manuscripts, papers, correspondence, business records, photographs, and other materials from a diversity of sources. Represented in our holdings are records of the Flemington branch of the American Red Cross, records from the Hunterdon County. Clerk, including deeds and slave manumissions, and papers from the Lambert Boeman post of the Grand Army of the Republic. Also to be found are the papers of important County individuals and families, such as the Capners, Bartles, and Larges, just to name a few.

The collections are not all in document boxes either; the Society also maintains a collection of over 1,400 bound manuscripts including the day books of prominent historical business concerns, hotel registers, diaries, and scrapbooks. All of these materials are open for reference and research use during the open hours of the Society's library. Some of the materials have been microfilmed and are available for viewing through that medium, while others are "in the raw" but accessible for those researchers who enjoy holding a bit of informative history in their (careful!) hands.

To care for these materials and to add to this collection of important history, the Society has employed a part-time Manuscript Curator for almost twenty years. Many older members will remember "Reverend George" who helped to organize the first portion of our collections. Ron Schultzel followed; he expanded the processed holdings of the archives to its current 72 collections.

Since 2004, the activities of the Manuscript Curator have been devoted almost exclusively to arranging and describing a massive collection of historical papers and other materials that belonged to arguably the most influential member of our Society, Hiram E. Deats. The Society already holds an equally massive portion of Mr. Deats collections. They represent a bequest to the library of many of the books and histories in the reading

room, the very familiar collection of genealogical files available t o

researchers, and archival collection No. 32, the Hiram E. Deats collection, which contains nine boxes of correspondence and other papers.

This collection, which will be identified as Collection No. 73, the Hiram E. Deats Papers II, will be opened to the public shortly. It is an extensive collection, a richly detailed look at the life of one of Hunterdon County's leading citizens of the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. It contains over fifty boxes of general correspondence alone, and is rounded out by large amounts of Mr. Deats personal records and records of his family. Also included is a large collection of material dealing with Mr. Deats passion for philately (he was an internationally known stamp collector). The records of Mr. Deats association with other inand terest civic groups, such as the DAR, Hunterdon County Schools, and the Agassiz Association, are also well represented. The records even include many documents and items of a historical nature, such as newspaper clippings, legal papers, and pamphlets; and for those visual historians the collection also includes over 450 unique photographs.

For those interested in the release of this collection, look to this space in the Newsletter in future editions. It is my intention to make From the Curator's Desk a regular feature of the Newsletter. It will be a place where the membership can get news and updates on the activities of the Curator, an alert regarding the upcoming releases of archival collections and reference materials, and a spotlight on those existing resources that members may not even know about.
