Doric House Open May 20 & 21,1-4 p.m.

The Society proudly opens the Doric House during Historic Preservation Week for members and the public to visit. The Doric House is opening Saturday 20 May and Sunday 21 May from 1-4 p.m. The Doric House is furnished as a typical gentleman's home *circa* 1850. It was built by Mahlon Fisher as his residence and he also built other Greek Revival style houses in Flemington. Learn more Greek Revival architecture and also about "Mr. Hunterdon" through exhibits and recollections in the Deats Memorial Library.

Who Is This Man?

He is a man of many faces! Some knew him as "Mr. Hunterdon." We know his history "face" but he pursued other interests as well. He was farmer, businessman, collector of stamps and coins, weather observer, landlord, civic supporter, and author/publisher.

This man, to whom the Society and its patrons are indebted for much of its collection, had several areas of expertise. The Historical Society's Deats Memorial Library is so-named to recognize him — **Hiram Edmund Deats** — who, for seventy-two years, gathered together the threads of Hunterdon County's history and thus preserved a varied resource for local history and genealogy research.

This year May 20 marks the 130th anniversary of his birth. It seems fitting we formally honor his memory, honor it especially on that day, in conjunction with the Historic Preservation Week theme, *Taking America's Past Into The Future*, for it was his devotion on behalf of the Society that gave us much of Hunterdon County's past to preserve for the future! Exhibits will highlight Mr. Deats' activities, historic and otherwise.

Recollections of Honoree Deats

Anyone who remembers Mr. Deats [he died in 1963], and recalls any anecdotes, reminiscences, etc., is invited to visit the Doric House on May 20 and 21 [1-4 p.m.] and share their memories with some of his family who will be here and as well Society members who may not have known him.

Granddaughter June Abegg Delafield and her sons, Robert and Cliff Zubrycki will be attending. June's mother, Marion Elizabeth Deats Abegg, was the Deats' second child, and the one who remained here in Hunterdon.


The Welsh Quilt

The actual maker of the quilts donated to the Hunterdon Historical Society by Josephine Miller is unknown. We can, however, narrow down the possibilities. The fabrics in the quilts are *circa* 1830 - 1840 so the quilts were probably made between 1830 and 1865. John Jacob Welsh was the first of the family in Tewksbury Township and settled a mile northwest of New Germantown (Oldwick) in 1797. The Welsh homestead in Fairmount was the residence for the Welsh family until the early 1970's. The house, originally a hotel, was built by a man named Crater in 1810. From 1823 to 1830, Jesse Gray ran the hotel and a race track on the flat southwest of the hotel. The property was acquired by the Welsh family after that time.

In all probability the quilts were made by Keziah Lee Fisher (Mrs. John Vandervoort Welsh). Keziah was the daughter of the Rev. George Fisher and his second wife, Sarah Chapman Cooper. Reverend Fisher was a well-known Methodist preacher who came to Tewksbury Township from the Changewater area in 1797. Sarah Chapman Cooper was a relative of the writer, James Fenimore Cooper. Each of Reverend Fisher's wives had ten children. Keziah was probably named for her Aunt, Keziah Leigh (born 1780, died October 21, 1855), the wife of Rev. George Fisher's brother, John. Born in 1829, Keziah Lee Fisher married John Vandervoort Welsh in 1847. She had two sons, William and Jacob and three daughters. The oldest daughter, Mary, was born in 1851 and Sarah in 1855. Both married and moved away from home and would have taken their quilts with them. Emma Jane Welsh who probably been too young. William Welsh, never married. Jacob Welsh married and lived in Brooklyn and returned to the homestead after his wife's death. John Vandervoort Welsh had a sister, Mary Ann Welsh, who married Jeremiah Field. She, too, would have taken her guilts with her. This only leaves Margaret Hull Drake, the wife of William Welsh, and mother of John Vandervoort Welsh.


Margaret Hull Drake was born on May 3, 1798, and died February 12, 1874. Her father was killed or deserted during

the War of 1812 so she and her brother, James, lived with their uncle. James Drake, born July 18, 1808 and died October 23, 1894, was a whaler as a young man. He went to sea in the 20s or 30s for two trips of 3 1/2 years each. In later years he was a shoemaker and lived near the Welsh homestead, east of the Methodist Church, on Route 512.

The Welsh homestead was sold in the early 1970s by Robert E. Welsh's widow, Hazel. As a best guess, the quilts were made by or belonged to Keziah Lee Fisher Welsh.



Obituary copied from The Christian Advocate of September 19, 1889:

WELSH.-KEZIAH L. FISHER WELSH, died in Christian triumph, at Fairmount, N.J., July 24, 1889, aged 60 years, 4 months and 22 days. She was a native of Fairmount, and passed fifty-years in view of the site of the church from which she was buried. Her father, George Fisher was a member of the first Methodist class here, and its appointed leader; he became a most devoted and useful local preacher. Scores of his descendants are membes of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and five of his great-grandchildren are in the Methodist itinerancy; his oldest son now living, George, aged 94, resides at Fairmount and was present at his sister's funeral. Sister Welsh's husband donated the present church site, and her father the land for the first church and the cemetery adjoining. When Keziah was 12 years old she attended a camp-meeting with her father at Whitehall, where she experienced religion. She united with the church and walked with God. She was universally esteemed. After years of conflict with disease, she died in Christian assurance. Two sons, three daughters, and her husband are bereaved. Her funeral services were conducted by the writer, assisted John Rutherford, pastor of the Presbyterian church, July 27th, 1889.

Quick-Servis Family Burying Ground

This private cemetery, now in Delaware Township, Hunterdon County, was formerly in East Amwell Township until 1897. It is located a short distance northwest of the village of Ringoes, on the "Trenton Road", Route 579. The yard is presently surrounded by a stone wall in some state of disrepair, built originally in 1848. Before that it was enclosed by a hemlock fence.

In the cemetery, about 150 feet square, there are, in addition to the stones with inscriptions, a number of unmarked graves. The inscriptions were copied 26 May 1918 by Theodore Bellis and Hiram E. Deats. Within the last few years efforts to restore the grounds and stone wall were on-going, directed by the East Amwell Township Historic Preservation Commission, James Davison and other local residents. The group received the 1918 list but to date we are not aware of an attempt to identify surviving stones from the 1918 list.

These inscriptions, as are those from 65 other County cemeteries, are carded into the Society's "Tombstone Inscription File." Commonly used abbreviations include h/o for husband of, wf/o for wife of, wid/o for widow of, dau/o for daughter of, s/o for son of. Notations on the original typewritten list in Mr. Deats' hand are noted with an asterisk *




IN HISTORICAL HUNTERDON 500

SERGEANTSVILLE. This village in what is now Delaware Township of Hunterdon probably takes its name from the crossroads store of Joseph, John, and Charles Sergeant, established about 1825. The name of Sergeantsville became official in 1827 when a postoffice was established at the store. A description in Barber and Howe in 1844, reads as follows: "It contains a store, tavern, and a few mechanics; a neat Methodist Church, lately erected, of stone, and stuccoed, and about a dozen dwellings." An 1881 description called it "a pleasant village located in School District No. 95, close to the center of the township." It had 139 people at that time.

Identification of everyone was probably recorded sometime after the photograph was taken as the date "189- 5?" is recorded in pencil on the reverse of the photograph. It is unclear whether to read the list left to right or right to left. However, the seated family members seem to be listed right to left as the second name is the female child, Elsie Robbins.

With the arrival of warmer weather, family reunions are being scheduled. The Robbins-Lawshe Reunion was an annual affair, the 21st annual being held in August 1945 at Milford. One of the items of business covered at each Robbins-Lawshe meeting was the maintenance of the Robbins Family Burying Ground located on the Pittstown-Bloomsbury road [Route 579] about 1/4 mile from Hickory Tavern. The inscriptions, with a copy in the HCHS collections, were copied by descendant John Fleming in June 1913 and Sylvester Robbins' father

and mother, Jonathan and Charity (Lomping) Robbins were interred there, he in 1872 and she in 1859. Family information following is taken from the ROBBINS folders in the "Deats Genealogical Files" at the Society. Sylvester Robbins, son of Jonathan and Charity, was born 14 December 1836 and married 13 January 1858 Sarah Isabella Bird. Sylvester and his wife had seven children:

1) Charles [1858-1907] married first 1887 Edna Thompson who were parents of Elsie Robbins, born 9 Aug. 1892, married second 1906 Mary Elizabeth Sally Mee

2) Benjamin Franklin Robbins [1863-1936] married 1887 Carrie Dolliver who were parents of Warren Mercer Robbins, born 21 May 1890

3) Robert Morris Robbins [1864-1866]

4) William Ellery Robbins [1865-1929] married 1892 Charity Sidders

5) Edward Rutledge Robbins [1870-1941] married first 1897 Katherine Keyser, second 1919 Helen M. Carroll

6) Roger Sherman Robbins [1873-] married first 1895 Mary Hyler, married second 1905 Hattie Hart

7) Mary Elizabeth Robbins [1879-] married 1902 Abram Van der Veer.
