# **TOUR DORIC HOUSE MAY 16 AND JUNE 7**

In celebration of Historic Preservation Week, May 10-16, the Doric House was open on the afternoon of 16 May from 1 - 4 p.m. and will again open its doors on Sunday afternoon, 7 June from 1-4 p.m. during the Stangl/Fulper Collectors Club weekend auction and commemoration of the twentieth anniversary of Stangl Pottery closing.

Mahlon Fisher's Greek Revival Doric House has been the Historical Society's headquarters since 1969, when it was purchased and restored. Mr. Fisher, a master carpenter, built the House as his private residence in 1846 and it has been furnished to portray a modest but typical Greek Revival home. This is but one example of his craftsmanship. He, of course, built several other Greek Revival homes in Flemington.

Exhibits focusing on Hunterdon County native John L. Purcell's participation in the Spanish American War and Paul Robeson 100th birthday memorial are featured in the Doric House this spring.

# *Rockefeller Roots* Meeting with David Rockefeller Result Of Assistance by Hunterdon Historical Society

I am sure many people living in Hunterdon County, New Jersey and around the Delaware River, are aware of the Rockefeller monument at Larison's Corner, near Ringoes. It was erected in the cemetery by John D. Rockefeller shortly after the turn of the century commemorating the first Rockefeller immigrant, Johann Peter Rockenfeller. His grandson, William Rockefeller, was the great grandfather of John D. Rockefeller, the first billionaire of modern times.

Johann Peter emigrated from the Neuwied area in the Rhineland of Germany in 1723, together with his wife and five children, and settled in Hunterdon County, New Jersey.

I was born in Germany, grew up and went to school in Neuwied and was aware that my Grandmother's name was Rockenfeller, and that she descended from a line of Rockenfellers for several centuries, and family information showed the Rockenfeller name going back to about 1750. The name is common in my hometown in Germany, and many families and businesses display the name Rockenfeller, which is unique to my hometown. It appears to have originated from the nearby hamlet of Rockenfeld. The phone book there still shows about 60 Rockenfellers and most people there seem to be aware that Neuwied is also the cradle of the great American family which contributed so much to the people of the United States.

I remember vividly some stories Grandmother used to talk about going back to the original emigration of Johann Peter or possibly his cousin, Johann Thiel Rockenfeller, who also emigrated to America, but ultimately settled in Germantown on the Hudson River in New York. It appears that my great--grandfather. Johann Peter Rockenfeller was born in 1696 and died in 1796. He was in his twenties when the two families emigrated and due to his longevity my maternal Great, grandmother born in 1847, heard the stories from her Grandparents, born in 1773, when my long-lived Great, grandfather was still alive. Amongst the stories that have stayed in the family Johann Peter walked with his wife and children down from the Westerwald, a distance of some 30 miles, to catch a boat down the Rhine River and had to wait for months. Someone in the emigrant's family also became very sick upon arrival in America, and corresponded with the homeland for the help of a doctor.

As I had my own family history back to the 1750's no information was available at first to connect the German branch of the Rockefellers to the American family. After much research I came across information leading me to the Larison's Corner cemetery where I hoped to find the date of birth and maybe further information from the gravestones. A visit to the cemetery only revealed the memorial (pictured right) but I was in sheer amazement at the similarity of the landscape of lower Hunterdon County to the place where Johann Peter lived near my hometown. The Delaware River clearly reminded Johann Peter of the Rhineland and one can easily understand why he settled here.

On advice of a friend who knew of my attempts to trace the American and German Rockefeller families, suggested I call the local historical society. I was fortunate that Roxanne K. Carkhuff answered the phone for the Hunterdon County Historical Society and after listening to my story suggested I try to obtain Dr. Henry O. Rockefeller's family genealogy, possibly located in the New York Public Library. When I was successful in obtaining the four volumes for study in the reading room and working my way through the family history I was almost touched to tears after seeing all the little villages surrounding my hometown mentioned in the Rockefeller books. Last, but not least, I quickly found my Grandparents in the volumes, as Dr. Rockefeller traced all of the German family branch as well in his research. It turns out the original emigrant Johann Peter was the Godson of my Great, great grandfather, Peter Rockenfeller, and indeed, I finally had documentary evidence that all of the American Rockefeller families are my distant cousins.

I decided that I should share this information with the Rockefeller family and was delighted that David Rockefeller, the patriarch of the family was most interested to meet with me. For a picture, at the end of the meeting, he asked me to hold a photograph with him, of his father, John D. Rockefeller, Jr., a great gesture on his part to show the family relationship.

Mrs. Carkhuff has provided some additional material and pointed me towards additional research which shows a wave of immigrants from the Rhineland 10-20 years after the Palatines in 1710, including Runkel families which also married into my family and which is a name that dates back almost one thousand years in my hometown. When Johann Peter settled in New Jersey, he was accompanied by his wife, Elizabeth Christina Runkel, who was born in Bonefeld (near Regsdorf).

# STANGL TWENTY YEARS AFTER . . .

The Stangl/Fulper Collectors Club proudly presents, *Stangl Twenty Years Later* on the weekend of June 5-7. The event commemorates the 20th anniversary of the close of the Stangl Pottery Company. The Club has planned a series of programs for the week culminating with their 7th Annual Auction on June 6 at St. Magdalen Parish Center on Mine Street in Flemington.

Plans are being formulated to gather as many former Stangl employees as possible for a panel discussion on Friday, with pottery demonstrations, and a dinner at Razberry's Conference Center.

The following morning, Saturday, the day begins at 10 a.m. with greetings from Stangl/Fulper Collectors Club president .

Then former Stangl sales manager, Jim Paul will share anecdotes on working at Stangl, followed by a question and answer period.

At noon there is time for the auction preview and lunch before the auction starts at 1 p.m. with approximately 240 lots being sold.

Sunday, June 7 the presentation moves to the old Hunterdon County Courthouse on Main Street where Don Hall will discuss American Art Pottery with emphasis on the Fulper pottery. Two showings of the 1930s Stangl promotional film will be presented by Gordon Gray.

Also, on Sunday, the Doric House will be open from 1-4 p.m. with Stangl/Fulper pottery pieces on exhibit.

## **Stockton Centennial**

Congratulations to Stockton—100 years old! The borough of Stockton was formed from Delaware Township on 14 April 1898. However, the village was already well populated [577 souls in 1880] and had a post office by 1851. As a village in Delaware Township it appears in the 1873 Hunterdon County atlas.

The *Stockton Sun*, E. C. Romine, editor, gives brief notes of the town's history. From that source we read Stockton was first known as Reading's, then Howell's Ferry, then Centre Bridge, but was Stockton by 1851 and so it has remained.



## Moore Genealogy in New Publication


An epochal genealogy for Spring 1998 release, presented in two parts by siblings, is not only a special document for family members of Moore lineage, but also a valuable source of information for researchers of the early German communities of Hunterdon County. The Genealogy is hard bound, contains 908 pages and has an every name index for easy reference.

Book I, *Tracing the Moore Settlers of Spruce Run, Hunterdon County, NJ, in Germany, Switzerland and Austria by* George Moore. The Mohrs were part of the large Palatine emigration to New York in the early 18th century, and who settled in the valleys of the Raritan River in New Jersey.

Book II, *The Ancestors and Descendants of the Moors of Hunterdon County, NJ, and Allied Families,* by Shirley Moore Barnes gives the history of the early family of Spruce Run and follows t his genealogy to the present day. Included in Book II is extensive material on the matrilineal lines who married into, and often intermarried within, the Moore and related families of Dutch, English, Scotch and German ancestry.
