## *Time to Reminisce* Flemington National Bank Topic of Fall Meeting November 16, 2 pm Flemington Womens Club


Members and friends are cordially invited to the Society's Fall Meeting to join with George Muller and other former Flemington National Bank associates in looking back at the history of the Bank.

"New Bank — Madam Rumor always has her tongue wagging. This day or two past she has been circulating the report that we are soon to have a new bank in George Rea's new building: [March 1876].<sup>1</sup>


"An effort is being made to have the new Bank open for business about the first of April. A place is being fitted up in Rea's new brick building. Mr. C.C. Dunham has accepted the Cashiership, and will leave the old bank in a short time."

The year the Flemington National Bank was founded, 1876, was the 100th anniversary of American Independence, Mark Twain was writing *Tom Sawyer*, National League baseball was founded, the telephone was invented, and the Centennial Exposition was held in Philadelphia. The Bank was a gas-lit building and Flemington's Main Street was unpaved.



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## Dr. John Blane's House

[Hunterdon County Historical Society Miscellaneous Collections, Part I, 5:185]

The following letter was found in the 1940s by Monroe DeMott during renovations to the building presently occupied by the Coach n' Paddock restaurant on Route 173 in Union (formerly Bethlehem) Township. The letter had been placed in a bottle and sealed in a stone wall years earlier.

The writer, Dr. John Blane, was one of Hunterdon County's doctors, practicing in the County for nearly sixty years, from 1827 until his death in 1885, and the author of a *History of the District Medical Society For the County of Hunterdon From Its Organization in 1821 to the Annual Meeting of 1871: Together With The Medical History of the County, published in 1872.* Dr. Blane served as historian to the District Medical Society, was a Fellow of the Medical Society of New Jersey, and a member of the American Medical Association.

A native of Middlesex County where he was born on 7 July 1802, he came to Hunterdon County, forming a partnership with Dr. W. A. A. Hunt at Clarksville. In April 1831 he removed to the place where the remainder of his life was passed. The Hunterdon Gazette carried the news of his marriage to Cornelia Hunt Smith on 28 May 1840.<sup>1</sup>

His wife Cornelia, survived him and died in 1911, at age about 90.

The transcript preserves original spelling and punctuation. A "/" signifies the end of a line in the original letter. The most likely interpretation of questionable words and/or dates are in brackets followed by a question mark. "This wing built in 1843 By John & Cornelia H. Blane / Our Children Nancy and John Octavus Blane /

Nancy was born 27th March 1841 /<sup>2</sup>

John was born 25 April 1842 & died 24 July 1843 and / lies buried in the family burying ground —

The foundation was dug 1842 by Joseph Rupell James / M. Glouchen who has since died and Patrick M. Guire / then just landed from County Longfan [*sic*] in Ireland.

The walls were laid up by James Dean William [Weaver ?] / Samuel Rounsaville and Peter Hoppock and Patrick Mc Guire.

The stone was handed by D. A. S. Coombs a native of [Delason ?] / County in New York State and Patrick Cole a Native of / Ireland and brother-in-law to Patrick M. Guire —.

At this time Hiram Green lives in the basement story / his wife Sarah Crooks they have two children Eldridge / and Adaline. The attendants on the masons are / John & Enoch Oaks —. The Carpenters William Evans / who quitting suddenly on account of Sarah Ann Horn / and his going away was [replaced ?] by William / Hardy and Barnet Andrews Smith

John Hulsizer Junr. lives in the log house family himself / wife and three children — Patrick M. Guire lives at the / Spring house family wife and one child Andrew and has / sent to Ireland for four others who are expected daily.

Christopher Young keeps the Brick tavern —

The Weather is uncommonly dry and crops generally much short —

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Done at the Blossom farm 2<sup>nd</sup> August 1843 by John Blane / Physisian [*sic*] and Surgeon and Major General / of the 4<sup>th</sup> division New Jersey Militia —"

### N. Burr Coryell Papers Received

Past, present and future Coryell genealogical researchers have, and will continue to benefit from N. Burr Coryell's lifetime collection, recently donated to the Hunterdon County Historical Society. Mr. Coryell has been editor/publisher of *Coryell Newsletter* for more than 25 years and he has generously made this donation to provide for future access to his data. Filling six cubic foot boxes, his shipment was received in July and is presently being processed by Manuscript Curator Ronald Schultzel. Once this phase is completed the data will be available for to consultation in the Deats Memorial Library.

Among the Society's other material on the family are *Emanuel Coryell of Lambertville, New Jersey and his Descendants* a brief history of the origin of Emanuel Coryell and the Coryell family with an outline of his descendants to the fourth generation, by Ingham Coryell, printed privately in Philadelphia, PA in 1943; *The Coryells: An American family and 300 years of its history* by Dallas Lee Coryell, 1972; the Coryell Papers, accession number 45, the (Collection of Ingham Coryell donated to this Society). His Papers consist of artifacts, five manuscript boxes and miscellaneous oversized and bound manuscripts, including *Coryell Genealogy: Coryell Ancestry of Levi L. Coryell Sr., and Levi Leland Coryell, Jr.* compiled by Philomena Jenkins, Lincoln, Nebraska in 1942.

The Coryells were probably French Huguenots. Ingham Coryell writes that quite likely Abraham Coriell, living in Piscataway Township in 1702, was the father of four sons: David, Emanuel, Samuel and Abraham.

Emanual Coryell was the progenitor of the Hunterdon County branch of the family. The earliest record of him is 24 August 1727 when he witnessed the will of Cornelius Teunissen of Raritan in Somerset County. Emanuel secured a patent from King George II in 1732 to operate a ferry across the Delaware River at what is now Lambertville.


Emanuel's seven children, five sons and two daughters (one of whom died young), were born between 1730 and 1743. Their father died in 1748-9 when all but John, age 19, were still minors. Emanuel's widow, Sarah, married second George fly of Bucks County, Pennsylvania.

While Ingham Coryell's published genealogy gives the early history of Emanuel's family, N. Burr Coryell's collection follows the families of Emanuel and his three brothers and the family's expansion throughout the United States.

The Society acknowledges N. Burr Coryell's gift with much appreciation.



## Who is this man?

Who is the man with Frederick Douglas?

Member Mary K. Large suggests the unidentified man standing beside Frederick Douglass may be Flemington resident Benjamin F. Lee, Sr. Can anyone verify this identification or suggest an alternative? Call the Society at (908) 782-1091.

Flemington Photographer, John C. Sunderlin, took the photogrraph of Frederick Douglass [1817-1895] and the unidentified African-American man standing next to him. Cathy Ingram, Museum Curator of the Frederick Douglass National Historic Site in Washington, DC is looking for assistance in identifying the unidentified man. Can you help?

Frederick Douglass, the well-known Negro orator and journalist, fell dead in the hallway of his residence near Washington, D.C. in 1895 while waiting for a carriage to convey him to a hall where he was to lecture that evening. He died not many miles distant from the county on the eastern shore of Maryland where he was born a slave in February 1817. His father was a white man, his mother a negress\*.

In 1885 Sunderlin, a native of New York, assumed occupancy of a photographic studio on the third floor of the Evans Building (later known as the Vosseller Building) at 116-118 Main Street in Flemington in 1885. Mr. Douglass died 20 Feb-


