Flemington Victorian Days

Tea Time at the DORIC HOUSE June 12 - 2-4 p.m

Flemington Victorian Days is happening Friday, June 10 through Sunday, June 19, in a cooperative venture spearheaded by the Flemington Business Association in conjunction with social and service organizations. The emphasis, of course, will be to recreate Victorian era experiences.

The Hunterdon County Historical Society is participating in Flemington Victorian Days with "Tea Time at the Doric House," in lieu of its Spring Meeting. The Doric House, Mahlon Fisher's Greek Revival residence, has been headquarters for the Historical Society since 1969. Mr. Fisher built the house as his private residence in 1846, during the era when he was building other similar style houses in Flemington. The Doric House has been furnished to portray a modest but typical Greek Revival home to honor Mr. Fisher. The House will be open for tours on June 12 from 2-4 p.m., set up for afternoon tea as it might have been in the 1880s.



Victorian Days

The celebration will kick off with an Ice Cream Social Friday evening, June 10, 6:30-9:30 at the Grange. Other events throughout the celebration are detailed in the "Victorian Days Calendar" on page 693. The Historical Society will hold open house, Tea Time at the Doric House, on Sunday, 12 June from 2-4 p.m.

Other things scheduled for Sunday include silhouette artist, Ruth Grabner, working at the Ark II Gallery, on Mine Street, from 11 a.m. - 4 p.m. and the Flemington Post Office 200th Anniversary Committee has planned an open house and special stamp cancellation on Sunday at the Flemington Post Office. The Stamp Collectors Club will present an exhibit at the Post Office during the special cancellation.

Dusenbery Store Accounts

In a letter dated 8 July 1926 in response to the New York Genealogical and Biographical Society which requested information on the Dusenbery family of Bethlehem Township, Hiram E. Deats commented, "This is all in the extreme northern end of the county with which I have little to do. My work has been in the southern and western sides of the county ..." Since a great deal of the Society's genealogical collection is comprised of the material Mr. Deats collected, we find ourselves always searching for additional material to add to our knowledge of the northern part of the county. The estate papers of John Dusenbery [1459J] add such information.

John Dusenbery, yeoman and merchant of Bethlehem Township wrote his will 15 April 1789, which was proved 28 May 1789. His wife, Johanna, and son, Henry, were named executors. An inventory of his personal estate was made on 13 May 1789 but a list of the outstanding debtors to his store was not made until three years later. The final estate accounting was filed 11 February 1811, over 21 years after the death of the testator.

A resident of Bethlehem Township, Hunterdon County, as early as 1761 when he was a taxpayer there, John Dusenbery's ancestral lines were probably in Hempsted, Long Island. Within a few years of 1761 he was elected to the Bethlehem Township Committee, which post he held for a dozen years until his election to the County Board of Chosen Freeholders in 1776. He completed his period of local government service in 1778 when he was elected a Commissioner of Appeals. That same year he recorded an ear mark to identify his stray cattle.

The exact location of John Dusenbery's 100 acre farm, tavern, and store has not been identified although Mr. Deats believed it was along the Musconetcong River west of New Hampton where Henry Dusenbery finally settled. The list of outstanding book debtors from Ledgers A, B, C, D, and E, owing a total of £510.14.7., in the 10 April 1792 appraisement of John Dusenbery's estate are reproduced below. Probably these persons who did business with Mr. Dusenbery resided within a short distance of his store, in either Hunterdon or Sussex County. In some instances the appraisal list cites a debtor's name followed by the statement "appears to have been settled with the testator." Where this occurs, an asterisk (*) has been placed following the name. Spelling and punctuation, or lack thereof. appearing on the original appraisal has been retained in the transcript. In rare instances, a person's occupation was noted aside a name and is so noted here.

Historically, tea was taken at breakfast and after dinner. The practice of drinking tea continued with the English and after they arrived in America its popularity spread. Governments saw tea as an excellent source of tax revenue, keeping prices outrageously high, leading to smuggled tea. The tea tax imposed on American Colonies by the British government resulted in "an enormous fancy-dress tea party in Boston in 1773, where the guests came dressed as Red Indians, they decided to renounce tea in favour of Independence." I

Afternoon tea is an English custom and a social as well as a culinary event. Anna, 7th Duchess of Bedford, is credited with its beginning. On an afternoon in 1840 she asked for a tray of tea, bread and butter and cake to be brought to her room to ward off her usual 4 o'clock lethargy. Thereafter she formed the habit which spread among her friends. As the century progressed afternoon tea became increasingly elaborate. By the 1880s ladies were changing into long tea gowns for the occasion, and tea services kept pace, becoming more ornate with side plates, bread and butter plates, cake stands and other accompaniments.

What started as a little hiatus for refreshment had become a full-blown social occasion with hot dishes, footmen handing round teacups and even professional musicians. Meanwhile the tea shop flourished for lesser mortals.

Afternoon tea has declined since World War II as the pace of life has speeded up so that it is no longer easy to pause at four for tea. Afternoon tea is still a graceful event which brings people together for a brief hour's pleasure and refreshment.

Rupell Family Cemetery

The Rupell family cemetery is located in Alexandria Township, Hunterdon County, approximately nine-tenths of a mile south of County Route #579 and Mechlin's Tavern, on the left side of Route #625, 150 feet from the road. It is surrounded by a stone wall on the property of Helen Grefe. The walls have been restored and the grounds are well-kept. Inscriptions from the extant stones were copied in February 1994 by member Barbara Moser and a copy of the transcript donated to the Historical Society collection. Annotations by Mrs. Moser, a Rupell descendent, are enclosed in parentheses in the transcript below.

Who Was John L. Lenhart?

If your answer was that he was the pastor of the Flemington Methodist Church in 1835, you are correct. Reverend John L. Lenhart [1805-1862] came to Flemington after having been ordained a Methodist minister in Philadelphia in 1830, followed by circuit preaching in Maryland from 1831 to 1834. Snell's *History of Hunterdon County* ... lists Reverend Lenhart as one of the early "preachers-in-charge" of the little band of Methodists struggling since 1822 to establish their Flemington Church. That he helped that noble effort is evidenced by the fact that during 1835 the church's membership grew from 127 whites and 5 blacks to 170 whites and 13 blacks.

But, do you know the rest of the story! For that we are indebted to Robert Drew Simpson and his article in the April 1991 issue of the magazine, "Methodist History."

March 8, 1862 marked an historical battle of the Civil War in the Chesapeake Bay at Hampton Roads when the iron-clad Merrimac of the Confederacy put an end to wooden battle ships. As author Simpson says, "more than timber and sails were rent that day proving the Merrimac's power when it attacked the Union's 50 gun frigate Cumberland, a wooden battle ship built in 1825. Human lives were spent; out of the compliment of 276 officers and men on the Cumberland 121 were killed or drowned. The heroism of that day has not been forgotten."

Reverend John L. Lenhart was a naval chaplain assigned to the Cumberland and lost his life in that battle, the first naval chaplain in American history to have lost his life in battle. No other chaplain in the United States Navy would sacrifice his life in battle until December 7, 1941 at Pearl Harbour. After leaving his charge in Flemington, Reverend Lenhart had numerous pastorates in New Jersey until 1847 when he received his appointment as a chaplain in the Navy. His last church was in Paterson when his health failed as a result of a serious throat infection. Viewing an uncertain future in the ministry with this illness, the chaplaincy seemed to the Reverend to be an answer to his prayers. So he sought the commission that came through on February 27, 1847 and served fifteen years in that capacity until the fateful day on March 8, 1862.

The crew of the Cumberland had been apprised of the probable attack on their vessel by the Merrimac. They watched on that day of Judgement as the Merrimac approached gaining a position to ram the old Cumberland which opened fire with her heavy guns but its cannonballs glanced off the Merrimac like "peas from a pop gun." The Merrimac returned the barrage and in 15 minutes the Cumberland was engulged in a "fiery hell." The Merrimac continued to rake the disabled vessel with heavy fire causing it to begin sinking as the casualties mounted; the decks were literally covered with dead and wounded.

After ramming the Cumberland once more the Merrimac steamed triumphantly away. Cumberland's commanding officer, Lt. Morris, ordered all that could to abandon ship. The last man to leave the wreck shouted for Chaplain Lenhart to follow. The Chaplain chose to remain with those he wished to comfort and he went to a watery grave, a

dedicated soul serving those about him that needed his help. Two hours after the battle began the Cumberland sank with all but her mast submerged and the poet, Reverend L.W. Peck wrote in the "Song of the Moniter,"

While shook the land and ocean beneath the defeaning sound
There stood the noble Chaplain a lion hart was he Who long had made the Bible his life's charge on the sea.

Christeen Wambough to Mahlon and Solomon Wambough

From time to time a document will be found recorded in an unexpected place, otherwise unknown, adding to historical and/or genealogical knowledge. Such is the case with a power of attorney recorded and struck through in a book of slave manumissions among the collections of the Hunterdon County Historical Society.

The record, reproduced hereafter vertabim, gives power of attorney from Christeen Wambough to Mahlon and Solomon Wambough.

"Know all men by these presents, That Whereas Paul Cool late of Amwell Township Huntington [sic] County in the State of New Jersey, deceased, by his last will and testament in writing, did give and bequest unto me Christeen Wambough of Warren County in the State of Ohio a legacy of two hundred dollars to be paid to me by the executors of said deceased, as in and by the said last will and testament may more fully and at large appear. Now know ye that I the said Christeen Wambough have made, ordained, constituted, and appointed Mahlon Wambough and Solomon Wambough or either of them my true and lawful attorney or attorneys for me and in my name and for my use and benefits ask, demand and receive by suite or otherwise of and from the Executors of the last will and testament of the sd. Paul Cool, the legacy of two hundred dollars aforesaid given and bequeathed to me as aforesaid and upon receipt thereof by or payment thereof to my said attorneys or either of them a general release or discharge for the same to make, execute and deliver hereby ratifying, confirming and allowing all my said attorneys or either of them may lawfully do in the premises. In witness whereof I have here unto set my hand and seal this twenty first day of June A. D. 1826.

Signed, Sealed & delivered in the presence of us Jacob Dixon Miller and John Mount. (signed by her mark) Christeen Wambough.

Personally appeared before me Silas Hurin one of the Justices of the peace in and for said county the above named Christeen Wambough and acknowledged..."
