Title: Descendents of Conrad Apgar

Extent of the unit of description: 4 boxes; 2 linear feet

Scope & Content / Abstract:

This collection constitutes the working papers for the descendents of Conrad Apgar, as reported in the multi-volume genealogy "The Descendents of Johannes Peter Apgard" published by the Apgar Association, 1984 et. seq. Each descendent is reported on a family group sheet, with the same identification number as is used in the published genealogy. The numbering begins with the 11 children of Johannes Peter Apgard, although some of the family group sheets have an initial 1 for Johannes Peter. The genealogy will serve as an index to this collection and should be used in conjunction with it.

For a number of descendents there is additional information, such as photographs of gravestones, history, birth and marriage certificates, newspaper articles etc. Some of that information is not included in the published genealogy. In addition there are individuals added after publication of the genealogy.

Johannes Peter Apgar emigrated from Germany to Hunterdon County in 1734. His 10th child, Conrad Apgar, was born in 1755.

Context:

Administrative / Biographical history: Apgar family genealogists organized the family into a multi volume genealogy published in 1984. Wayne Apgar, the donor of this collection, specifically focused on the descents of Conrad, who is numbered as the tenth child. The Apgar Association is focused on researching the descendents of Friedrich 'Fritz' Epgert, who was discoved to be the patriarch of the Apgar family in 2002, as well as hosting reunions.

Structure:

System of Arrangement: Numerical according to descendent numbers as given in "Johannes Peter Apgard and His Descendents". This collection is ordered by generation rather than by line of descent.
