# James Wilson Marshall Topic of Fall Meeting

The State of New Jersey's acceptance of the boyhood home of Lambertville's most famous son, James Wilson Marshall, discoverer of California gold at Sutter's Mills in 1848 will be




commemorated at a joint meeting of the Hunterdon County and Lambertville historical societies on Sunday, October 30, at 2 p.m. at the Lambertville Baptist Church.

"The Gold Rush", a film strip on Marshall's role in the greatest mass migration in this country's history, will be shown after a brief address by the newly appointed head of the State's Historic Sites Division

whose name will be announced by Commissioner Roe of the Dept. of Conservation and Development on October 10.

A resolution thanking Bishop Ahr of the Diocese of New Jersey and Father Loughman of St. John's Church for the gift of the house to the State will be presented at the meeting. A resolution of thanks will also be presented conveying to the State the gratitude of both historical societies for the State's proposed restoration of the Marshall home to its appearance in 1816 and for its eventual use as a Marshall memorial and as a home for the Lambertville Historical Society.

#### JAMES MARSHALL HOUSE

Built in 1816 by Philip Marshall, this house was, until 1834 the home of James Marshall, who discovered gold in the race of a California sawmill in 1848. The Gold Rush of '49, set in motion by his discovery, enriched the country by a billion dollars in gold. Although at one time a rich man, Marshall died penniless because of his generosity. Gold nuggets sent to Lambertville by him are embedded in the cornerstone of the Lambertville Baptist Church across the street from his home.



Vosseller family papers, mss. of articles by Elizabeth Van Fleet Vosseller, and of her father Elias Vosseller, the noted local historian, records relating to the Flemington Choir School, and photograph albums have been received from the Estate of the late Mrs. James Mac-Fie Smith (Bertha Vosseller)

The Flemington Choir School under Miss Vosseller's direction achieved nationwide recognition. Many of her pupils developed notable musical careers of whom perhaps the singer Paul Robeson is best known.
