Ringo Family Historian Speaker at October Meeting

David Leer Ringo, Jr., a 9th generation descendant of Philip Jansen Ringo of New Amsterdam who came to America before 1643, will discuss the Ringo family history at our Fall Meeting to be held at Ringoes in the Amwell Valley Fire House, Saturday, October 21, at 2 p.m.

Mr. Ringo, of Fort Mitchell, Ky., for 35 years has done research in this country and abroad relating to the Ringo family. In 1939 he was elected a Fellow of the American Institute of Genealogy in recognition of his original research work.

Preceding the meeting a home style ham dinner will be served by the Amwell Volunteers at the Fire House at 12:15 p.m.


Historic sites in Ringoes will be identified by numbered placards for those who wish to visit them. The tour includes the Ringo burial ground and monument.

Invitation to a Reception

Members of the Society and their friends are invited to be guests of the Hunterdon County National Bank at a reception to be held at their Whitehouse Office on Sunday, October 29th, from 2 to 4:30 p.m. The invitation has been extended by President William J. Kinnaman and by Mr. Willard R. Young, Vice President and Whitehouse Office Manager.

The Whitehouse Office is housed in the recently restored Wyckoff mansion which stands in the northwest corner of the intersection of the Oldwick-Whitehouse Road and U.S. Route 22. The home dates approximately from Revo-

lutionary times and was the homestead of the old Wyckoff plantation, the first conveyance made out of James Logan's large tract. With its purchase in 1725, Simon Wyckoff introduced the now-numerous family to the county and unknowingly prescribed the course of the present highway.

Restoring to practical use of this historic and architecturally notable building represents historic preservation at its best. Architect Arthur C. Aalholm, is to be commended for his skill and sympathetic handling of the restoration.

Pays Dividends

A letter dated March 7, 1843 addressed to "Mr. Jacob Johnson, Revolutionary Pensioner.. Sidney, Hunterdon Co., N.J." given to the Society at the May meeting by member James R. Johnson of Clinton enabled us to repay Mr. Johnson's generosity with many interesting details of his great-great-great grandfather's Revolutionary activities.

The letter, containing suggestions about reporting the veteran's war service, prompted us to send for his pension application which turned out to be a windfall!

First in Jacob's file are two pages torn from the family Bible giving births of Jacob and Sarah, his wife, their marriage, and births of their ten children.

Next, in a sworn statement from which we give abstracts: Jacob Johnson deposes that after his return from Perth Amboy as a private, he was elected Lieutenant in Philip Snook's company at an election in John Ott's blacksmith shop in Amwell Township.

As Lieutenant, Johnson marched with his Company to Woodbridge in 1776 and later in the year, served one month at Bound Brook where he was on picket guard at the HQ of General Anthony Wayne where, upon the sudden approach of the British, Johnson gave the alarm which allowed Wayne to escape from the back door of his dwelling.

In 1777, Johnson served one month at Haddon-field "when the British took Red Bank Fort"; one month at Pompton Plains against the Tories; one month at Coejman's, Somerset Co., making bullets; one month guarding a magazine; one month at Passaic Falls "there we had a small schermage with the British"; one month at Princeton and one at Hopewell Meeting.

In 1778, Johnson served at the Battle of Monmouth. He was also called out on the following alarms: Elizabethtown, Pompton Plains, Hackensack, Bridgetown, Princeton, Shanick Meeting House, Bayard's Mills "where we took more than 90 wagons from the British".

Also at Sourland Mountain for 10 days and "then was called in Pennsylvania where was drove over with the army. Some hot firing where we had to stay five weeks, was frequently crossed over the River, in order to annoy the British".

This was "just before the Battle of Trenton."
During the winter of 1778-79, he enrolled in the Continental Service as a carter under Alexander Thompson of Ringoes.

On one occasion Johnson shot a Hessian who was robbing Major Stout and saved the Major's life. The Major offered him a"half joe" (a golden coin worth \$8.81) as a bounty which Johnson refused.

Later, Johnson took part in the Battle of Springfield "at the time they (the British) burned the Meetinghouse at that place."

(ED. Note: Jacob died April 10, 1846 at 92 and his wife Sarah April 3, 1853 at 100. They are buried in Bethlehem Presbyterian Graveyard, Grandin. Mrs. Johnson's statement corrected error in gravestone inscription) N.C.W.
