"HERALDRY TODAY" Topic of January Meeting

The 86th Annual Meeting of the Society will be held in the new wing of the Flemington M.E. Church, Main & Maple Streets, Sunday, January 17 at 2 p.m.

John McMahon of Rocktown will tell of present day adaption of the ancient art of heraldry to military, governmental, commercial and personal use in America today.

Mr. McMahon, President of the Trenton 112th Field Artillery Association, operates "Decor by Florestone", a company executing heraldic and symbolic emblems by a special molded stone process.

Recently Mr. McMahon designed and executed a coat of arms for East Amwell Township bearing heraldic symbols recalling its early origins.

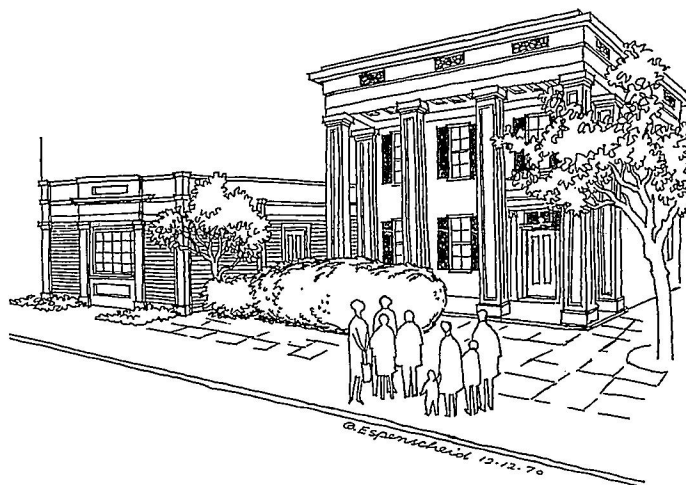

PROPOSED DORIC HOUSE ALTERATIONS.

The cement block wing addition to our 1846 Doric House will be altered to harmonize with the classic beauty of Mahlon Fisher's Greek Revival mansion.

The present facade will be sheathed in wooden siding with decorative flat pilasters. A classic cornice will add approximately 5 inches which with the siding will extend the present facade a maximum of 8 inches.

A new front display window and a library entrance on the off street side will be added in keeping with the Greek Revival design so favored by Fisher, Flemington's "Provincial Genius" designer-builder.

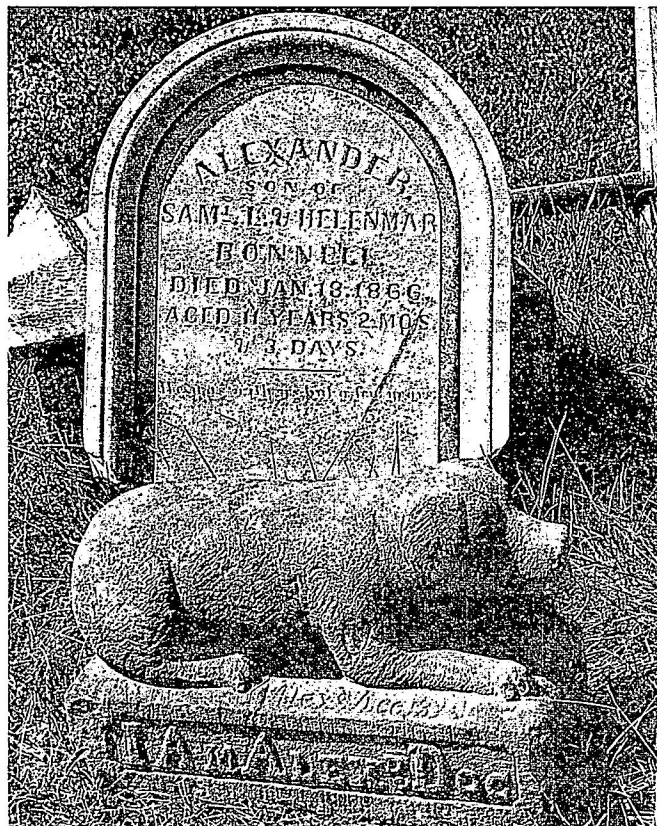
1970: A YEAR OF ACHIEVEMENT

STEVENSON FAMILY BURYING GROUND:
East of Lambertville, on Linvale Road, on a farm owned and occupied by Elnathan Stevenson. About 100 feet south of road, 40 x 60 feet in size, enclosed by stone wall. Copied Oct. 8, 1922, by Hiram E. Deats and Theodore Bellis. (See Egbert Bush's story in the Hunterdon Democrat, June 25, 1936, Ed.)

Stevenson, Elnathan. Oct. 30, 1842, in 81st year.

Stevenson, John. Son of Elnathan & Mary. Sept. 12, 1793, in 4th year.

Stevenson, Mary. Wife of Elnathan, May 12, 1833. In 67th year.

"About 20 unlettered stones still stand. Slaves buried outside the wall".

THE NEGRO IN HUNTERDON COUNTY



SILVIA DUBOIS,
BORN MARCH 5th, 1768.

Sylvia Dubois of Cedar Summit in the Sourland Mountains was visited by Dr. Cornelius W. Larison Jan. 27, 1883 in her Rock Mills hut. A 116-year-old colored woman who remembered the battles of New Brunswick and Princeton.

Her dress "was not Parisian" Dr. Larison observed, "but adjusted with the genius of the African race". "Her love of freedom is boundless", he added.

Dr. Larison published her biography at his Ringoes', N.J. Press in 1883: SYLVIA DUBOIS. . . THE SLAVE WHO WHIPPED HER MISTRESS AND GAINED HER FREEDOM. 8vo. 124 p. Printed in Larison's phonetic spelling with diacritical marks.

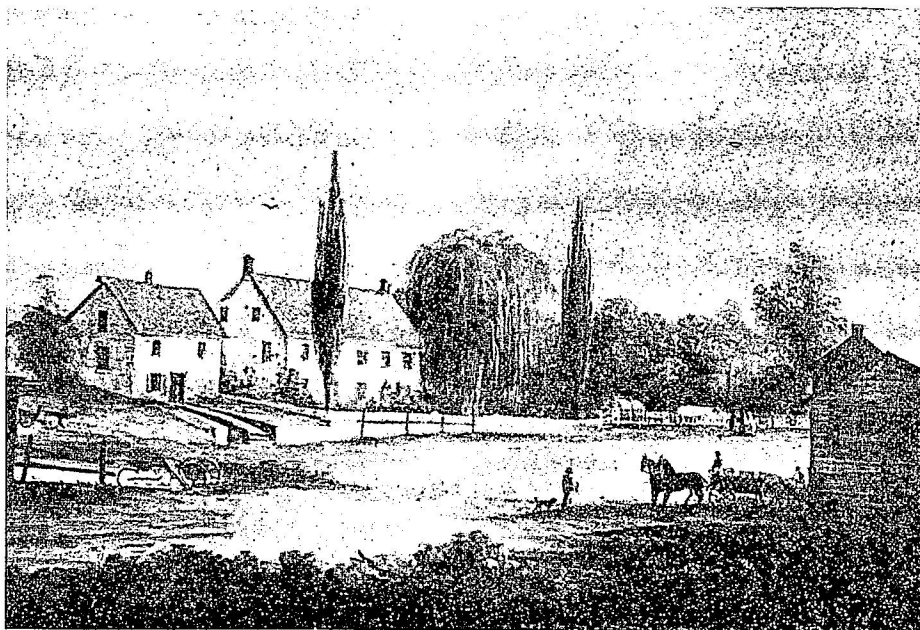

PRALLSVILLE

FOUNDED 1793. NOW PART OF STOCKTON BORO



"View of Prallsville", ca. 1858. Painted by Thomas W. Whitley of New York City for John Parker Prall.

John Prall, Jr. (1756–1831), founder of Prallsville, purchased land and a mill here in 1792 from George Ely, Jr. He was a Revolutionary War veteran of the battles of Millstone, Germantown and Monmouth.

Prallsville Post Office, established 1832, continued until Stockton P.O. was established in 1851. No Prallsville cancellations are known to philatelists.

Miss Marion C. Prall of Boonton, N.J., a Life Member of our Society, recently donated a number of color print photos of family paintings including "Prallsville from the Hill" showing the oil and saw mill established by John Prall, Jr. who opened the Prallsville Quarries in 1830. The old stone store building, still standing, was operated for many years by his son William Livingston Prall and his son-in-law, Jacob Lambert.

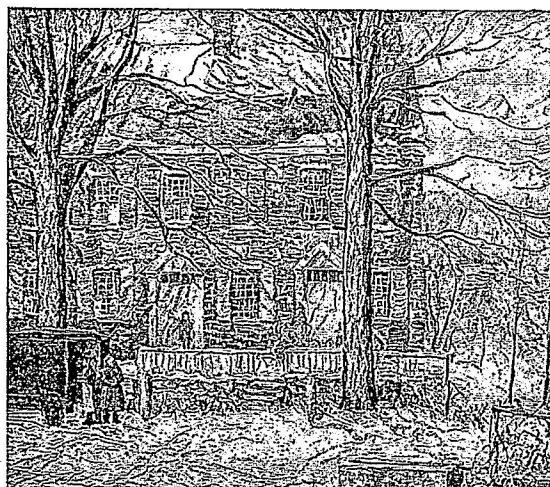
"The Prall Family", in diary form, by John Parker Prall (Commenced August, 1876), a typescript copy of which has been given to the Society by Miss Prall makes reference to the above painting by Whitley:

"In order to preserve for myself and my children a remembrance of the dear spot where I had seen such happy days, I took with me an artist by the name of Whitley to Prallsville where the three sketches now in the parlor, were taken and one of the 'Big Spring', for my brother Harry.

"Interest in the place seemed to wane in after years and now is almost a wreck. Its former loveliness is gone".

(Ed. Note: All of the Prall houses have been restored to their original 'loveliness' and today are occupied by Mr. and Mrs. John Matthews, Mr. and Mrs. Paul B. Paalborg, members of our Society, and the Prall-Woolverton house on the hill now owned by St. John Terrell):

The Prall Diary makes reference to the Bodine family and their employment by the Prall family. The Bodine family now own part of the original Prall property.

FAMILY BIBLE RECORDS

The Society has received from the Estate of the late Harvey Cooley of Spring Mills, Alexandria Township, family papers and photographs.

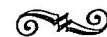

Hunterdon Artist Recorded in "Catalogue of American Portraits"

PROJECT OF
THE SMITHSONIAN INSTITUTIONS'
NATIONAL PORTRAIT GALLERY

Portraits by Hunterdon artist William Bonnell of Clinton, N.J. (1804–1865) will be represented in the National Portrait Gallery by a number of photographs of his paintings found and photographed by the Hunterdon County Historical Society.

"Mary Woolverton Bray", wife of Hunterdon's Revolutionary War Hero, Capt. Daniel Bray, painted by Bonnell in 1825 is perhaps, historically, the artist's most important painting. It was presented to the Hunterdon Historical Society in 1939 by the executors of Susan Bray Batemen's estate. (Illus. Vol. 4, No. 2, p. 4)

Recently restored by art experts, it is perhaps the Society's most valued possession.

Other photographs contributed by our Society include: "Andrew Bray" (1784–1849) painted 1825, and Sara Rittenhouse Bray (1796–1882), son and daughter-in-law of Capt. Daniel Bray. (Privately owned by Bray descendants).

Also: "Charles Bonnell" (1795–1870), proprietor of Flemington's old Main Street "Bonnell Tavern". (Privately owned) (Illus. Vol. 6, No. 1, p. 9).

"Rachel Woolverton Bonnell" (1776–1836), wife of Clement de Mont Bonnell, mother of William Bonnell, The artist's mother is represented in the Society's collection by a photograph of the original owned in 1921 by A.L. Berry of Springfield, Ill. Present location unknown.

"Self Portrait" by William Bonnell known through a statement "owned by a cousin" made by A.L. Berry in 1921. Present location unknown.

Attributed to William Bonnell is "Samual Stryker" of Lambertville, N.J. founder of the Stryker Library. Owned by the Lambertville, N.J. Public Library. (Illus. Vol. 4, No. 1, p. 4).
